1. Call to Order

- 2. Adequate notice** of this meeting of the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Mount Arlington was given as required by the Open Public Meetings Act as follows: Notice was published in the Daily Record and Roxbury Register on December 11, 2014; notice was posted on the bulletin board in the main hallway of the Municipal Building on December 3, 2014 and has been available to the public; notice of this meeting is on file in the office of the Borough Clerk.

10. Mayor's Report

- The Mayor read his report into the record.

- The Mayor recently attended a meeting with the NJDEP regarding the weed harvesting program for Lake Hopatcong; basically they are looking for financial assistance from the four towns surrounding the lake. The Mayor stated that should the lake get overgrown with weeds, the property values in the Borough will do down, throughout the entire Borough. The Mayor still advocates user fees for those using the lake and gave a brief history of the lake funding and his work/involvement as Lake Commissioner. Council agreed to further discuss the matter of lake funding at the next Council meeting when all Council Members are present.

- The Mayor stated he had his MRI and CAT Scan today and everything is stable.

12. Municipal Administrator's Report

- Attended the Lake Hopatcong Block Party on May 9th which was a huge success.

- Attended a Landfill Redevelopment Committee meeting; we are continuing forward with the various processes. Borough Planner Caldwell's report will be on the agenda for the Land Use meeting in June.

- Completed the Sustainable Jersey application process with the assistance of Matrix. We were applying for our bronze recertification; we needed 350 for silver certification and we submitted 440.

- Met with NJ Natural Gas regarding future projects but also wrapping up work that has been completed. Letters will be sent to residents where work has already been done letting them know that paving will commence in those areas; if they are interested in natural gas, they need to contact NJ Natural otherwise there is a five year moratorium before anyone can hook in again. Natural Gas will also be sending the survey letters to Lake Rogerene. The Mayor added that we will have a meeting with the residents explaining the gas process and to answer any questions.

- Met with the residents who own property directly involved with the Howard Boulevard realignment project.
- Attended the DARE graduation and the Police graduation for Joseph Parichuk.
- Continuing to receive lifeguard applications; one on for tonight's meeting and at least two more at the following meeting
- Borough Engineer Watson and Ms. Rinaldi met with School Superintendent Jane Jameson and Robin Tedesco from the school to discuss how the Howard Boulevard realignment project will impact the schools regarding bus schedules, notifying parents, etc.
- The Master Plan Committee, a subcommittee of the Land Use Board, is continuing to meet at least monthly; the plan is to have the re-examination of the Master Plan completed and brought to Council in September. Planner Caldwell will be at our next Council meeting to discuss the COAH matters involved with the Master Plan.

13. Council Committee Reports

Councilman Stanzilis:

- Attended the May 9th Block Party with the Boy Scouts; huge success and feels it will be a long standing tradition.
- Pleased to see that the road connecting ShadowWoods and Fieldstone has been approved. The Mayor stated it is feasible now because they eliminated one of the buildings. This will provide a gated emergency access for Lake Rogerene and sidewalks will be installed as well.

Council President Sorge:

- Enjoyed the Block Party, especially the drones overhead.
- Suggested that as the landfill solar project is being done, we invite the school students to take a field trip to see exactly how the project is built.
- Attended the Memorial Day Parade, excellent, speakers were very good
- Attended the Police Graduation for Joseph Parichuk, awesome and solemn.

Councilman Cangiano:

- Attended the Lake Hopatcong Block Party which was a great event.
- The Recreation Committee is looking to streamline applications and payments; they are looking at a variety of vendors but looking at low cost and most user friendly. Ongoing process, will keep Council informed.
- Thanked Carolyn Rinaldi and Paul Nelson for their efforts to obtain the Green Team/Sustainable Jersey Recertification paperwork in on time and the items needed to be eligible for Silver classification; if not, we have all the requirements to maintain our Bronze level.
- The Mount Arlington water meters are in the twenty-year-old range, not very efficient and will have to be replaced. Looking at Sensus to replace our meters; Sensus is on state contract so we do not have to go out to bid for the supplier but we do have to bid for the installations. We do have the line items for this expenditure planned into the budget. Ms. Rinaldi explained that the cost will be absorbed by the user fees and an ordinance will be forthcoming; when you are authorizing debt for something like this it is 5% down, that is already planned for in the capital budget. Moving forward, to pay for that debt, it would be paid for by the water users. Councilman Cangiano stated that once the meters are fully installed and operational, it would be a good time to perform another water study in the Borough.
- There are existing water mains that are remnants from the old Kadel Avenue/Richard Drive improvements done in the late 1960's-1970's; the rest of the main is up to date and up to code. This will be a simple improvement project, while installing the new meters as well; this project will again utilize the same funding formula as the new meter system.
- We received notification from NJDEP that because of reserves that we have related to the Nolan's Ridge project, Mount Arlington water is at its' limit for water allocation. We have engaged a water and sewer consultant to get the reserves removed appropriately.

Motion: Council President Sorge stated that Ordinance 06-15 be introduced by Title and passed on First Reading and that a meeting be held on July 7, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building, 419 Howard Boulevard, Mount Arlington, NJ, for a Public Hearing, consideration of Second Reading and Passage of said Ordinance, and that the Clerk be directed to publish, post and make available said Ordinance in accordance with the requirements of law.

Second: Councilman Stanzilis
Ms. Rinaldi stated there will be an amendment to this ordinance because the costs associated are not all inclusive; there are engineering costs that were not included in the figures she received. Borough Engineer Sabine Watson was present and stated that the ordinance as introduced was presented to the County; it included their construction costs and then split between the County share and the Borough share. The additional soft costs for planning/design as well as the inspection services were not included, which totals an additional \$203,270. The entire project cost would be just over \$1,019,674. The County program is specific only to the hard construction costs, which is \$816,404; they pay for everything within the roadway and the stormwater management and the Borough pays for the sidewalk and lighting. We had to introduce this ordinance tonight because going forward, we want to go out to bid this month, subject to County review and approval. The project will be initiated in August, with completion in November. There will be minimal disruption, if any, to the school bus and walking routes. Borough Attorney Matthew O'Donnell stated we would have the amended version of this ordinance upon second reading.





Mount Arlington students tackle worldly issues

MOUNT ARLINGTON --If you need a solution to a global, worldly problem, just ask a borough student.

Students in the grades K-8 school district attended the Model United Nations Conference held at Drew University in January to debate and defend their resolutions on Global Pandemic Management, Global Climate Change, and Counter-Terrorism.

The program, which is coordinated by the New Jersey Consortium for Gifted and Talented, is established in conjunction with the political science program at Drew University.

Drew University's United Nations Semester is the oldest collegiate program of its kind in the nation, and it is recognized as a non-governmental liaison group for the United Nations. The collegiate mentors, who coordinate the conference, serve internships at the United Nations and have access to UN council meetings.

Global Pandemic Management

According to teacher Julie Crawford, Mount Arlington sent a grade 8 delegation for the country of Slovakia and a grade 7 delegation for the country of Venezuela. The delegation for Venezuela represented by Allison Zlotnick, Carly Longtine, and Allison Harbinsky received an award for "Best Resolution."

This delegation presented solutions that addressed medical protocols for numerous diseases as such Ebola, influenza, and tuberculosis and emphasized the importance of establishing research facilities based on regional centers as established by the World Health Organization. The delegation for Slovakia presented by Melissa Hughes, Naria Rush, and Emily Miller also received a "Best Resolution Award."

They defended the Slovakian perspective and called for access to educational materials distributed by traditional pamphlets and posters as well as social media.

Global Climate Change

Mount Arlington sent two grade 7 teams for the countries of Nigeria and Ireland. The delegation for Nigeria represented by Andrew Cangiano and Logan Krzastek received awards for "Best Delegation", and the delegation of Ireland represented by Keyan Rogalsky and Marcus Roldan received awards for "Best Resolution."

Both delegations presented the use of infrared technology to scan urban centers to identify heat loss in major buildings as part of the solution. Cangiano and Krzastek also presented a schematic of a futuristic fueling station with access to electrical chargers, biodiesel, and hydrogen fuels. They also recommended the use of particle seeding in the atmosphere to help repair the ozone layer.

Rogalsky and Roldan discussed the use of solar panels, wind energy, and Pedal-A-Watt charging systems as well as the impact of deforestation.

Counter-Terrorism

Mount Arlington sent grade 8 delegations for the countries of Togo and Costa Rica. Delegate Paolo Teodorescu and delegate Sarah Mostafa both received an award for “Best Delegate.”

Teodorescu purported strict monitoring of export and import records worldwide, an international coast guard to address piracy, regional military alliances, a human rights campaign, and socio-economic development in regions by the United Nations’ World Bank Development Program as modeled by the Bali program from the 1970s.

Mostafa, supported by Delegate Cynthia Cote, identified the risk of terrorism by country and also emphasized the importance of the “Four Pillars” of the UN’s Global Counter Terrorism Strategy.

Students reflected on the experience, and said they found it both fun and educational.

“I definitely enjoyed the Model UN program this year because of the way young students could use good communication skills to find a solution to issues in today’s world,” said Sarah Mostafa.

“Actively participating in a program that resembles the real United Nations showed me how challenging it is to debate and to discuss ways to make a difference in the world. “

Carly Longtine agreed.

“The Model UN experience helped me realize the problems in our world and got me thinking about how we can stop them. The way they set up the committees felt very professional and gave me a look into what real Model UN representatives do,” she said.

Andrew Cangiano said the experience was amazing.

“I think it was a truly great experience being able to learn and work on some the major problems existing in our world today, such as global pandemic, climate change, and terrorism – Coming up with our own ideas and resolutions to try and help solve these issues; we also had the opportunity to then debate on which ones we think are most suitable and useful for us today.”

Marcus Roldan agreed.

“The Model United Nations at Drew University was a very fun and memorable experience that I will never forget,” he said.

"I really like that all of the ideas come from students. Also, it showed me what is happening in the United Nations Conferences and why they are so important. The whole program was very well conducted by the Drew University students. They knew what they were talking about and allowed us to come to various conclusions.

"In addition, this event allowed me to gain better knowledge about the world and the way it works. It also allowed me to better appreciate the amount of effort that it takes to solve a problem on worldwide basis. As a whole, I think that the program at Drew University was a great expedition."

Naria Rush said she learned some valuable life skills during the event.

"Model UN is a very valuable life experience; it gives students a first-hand insight into what the United Nations does. From brainstorming a resolution, to voting for, or against your fellow committees, there aren't any activities missed," she said.

"Students are put into an environment where they are considered semi-vulnerable; they have to interact with complete strangers and somehow find a way to meet an agreement. It's incredible how we can write a final resolution that includes everyone's ideas considering the time restraint and amount of people included.

"Without a doubt, the Model UN program my school provides is not only greatly appreciated, but also life-changing for my peers and me".

Crawford said the district has invested in the future of its students by providing access to the technology that allows them to discover how the world functions to solve real life issues.

"This allows our students to understand how to become responsible citizens and how to map out a pathway to be a future leader. Students spend three months using on-line resources to discover how the United Nations works and to research the social-economic conditions and geo-political role of their assigned country and region," she said.

"They use authentic UN resources and resolutions including videos posted by the United Nations to review the speeches of UN leaders. This program coupled with our school's hybrid technology model, including IPADS, Macs and computers, gives students an opportunity to look a world issues through a different lens or world perspective while at the same time developing their digital research skills."

Superintendent Impressed

Superintendent Jane Jameson provided the following comment:

“The students of Mount Arlington have demonstrated a focused dedication to the concerns presented at the Model United Nations Conference,” she said.

“Their perspective and creative ideas regarding world challenges such as Global Pandemic Management, Climate Change and Counter Terrorism, demonstrate deep understanding and a well-educated and researched perspective on the future of their planet. As always, we are extremely proud of our students’ efforts and their sincerity in exploring world challenges, while presenting thoughtful perspectives and carefully thought through plans for a better world in their futures.

“Kudos to our teacher, Julie Crawford, for her efforts in making certain that our students are challenged and prepared to enhance their learning opportunities,” she said.





After working on their vehicles for months, students race and take place in judging in the categories of Creativity, Technical Merit, Speed, Best Use of Recyclables, Progress Journal or Portfolio, and People's Choice.

The Hydra designed by Richard Temple and Cynthia Cote and analyzed by Sheryl Peng and Carla Farris, placed 2nd in People's Choice and 3rd in Portfolio records, is based on a Greek mythology theme. This team enhanced their vehicle's performance by choosing larger wheels which thrust the Hydra further based on the circumference of their wheels. They received bonus points for their creative writing component.

The Concert, designed and analyzed by Melissa Hughes, Emily Miller, Naria Rush, and Sarah Mostafa, placed 3rd in Creativity. Their vehicle serves as a transport vehicle to move a portable stage from region to region. They enhanced the vehicle's performance by including multiple sets of reflectors designed to capture more of the sun's photons.



Paige Metje, Amanda Poskitt, Monisha Nath, and Vanessa DeBona & The Ice Abominator

The Ice Cream Abominator designed by Monisha Nath and Vanessa DeBona and analyzed by Paige Metje and Amanda Poskitt, placed 2nd in Creativity and 2nd in Portfolio records, enhanced the vehicle's performance by designing a system of expandable poles to change the orientation of the solar panel to capture more photons.



Andrew Cangiano, Marcus Roldan, and Nicholas Temple & The Fridgerator

The Fridgerator, designed and analyzed by Marcus Roldan and Andrew Cangiano and analyzed by Nick Temple, placed 1st in three categories: Technical Merit, Creativity, and Portfolio records. Their vehicle is a mechanized cargo cart which carries a solar powered refrigerator. They received bonus points from the judges by including additional research from NOAA resources on the angle of incidence of the sun at the extra date and time of the races. This way they knew the extra angle at which to pitch their solar panel. To test the cars in the winter months, they also evaluated which kind of AA batteries would provide them with the most number of test runs.

STEM teacher Julie Crawford adds, "This program exemplifies the focus of the Next Generation Science Standards. Science is presented as an interdisciplinary unit of study where students conduct background research on the physics of motion and energy and then apply their knowledge to produce a working model. They collect data and use spreadsheet technology and on-line statistical programs to analyze their vehicle's performance to look for patterns. Not only can the students use math and science skills, but if they want they can earn points for creativity and include both technical and creative writing pieces."


