JUNE 12, 2018
7:00 p.m.**

1. Call to Order

- 2. Adequate notice** of this meeting of the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Mount Arlington was given as required by the Open Public Meetings Act as follows: Notice was published in the Daily Record and the Roxbury Register on December 14, 2017 and posted on the bulletin board in the main hallway of the Municipal Building on December 6, 2017; notice of this meeting is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act (N.J.S.A. 10:4-1 et seq.), the Borough Council opens every public meeting for comments of the public. However, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 10:4-12: "Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the discretion of a public body to permit, prohibit or regulate the active participation at any meeting,...."

Speakers at Borough meetings shall have five minutes to present their comments to the Borough Council so as not to consume time that would otherwise be allotted to other persons who wish to speak.

At the mandate of Council President, all Councilpersons shall not discuss or address in the Public portion of this meeting any matter that is: 1) pending litigation; 2) ongoing investigation of any type; 3) potential litigation; and 4) personnel or any comments regarding any Borough employee without being given Rice Notice.

9. Mayor's Report

- Congratulated Council President Sorge and Ray Simard (in the audience) on the recent Primary Election.
- The Mayor's Wellness Committee has provided nutrition and lifestyle guidance classes for our Seniors for free, which have been well received and well attended. The Committee will be starting a campaign for weight management which may include a weight loss challenge.
- The 5K falls under the Mayor's Wellness Committee as well and will be in October, date unknown as of yet. We have been competing with a lot of events on Saturday mornings in early October so this year the 5K might be early evening on a weekday which might enable more people to participate.

10. Chief of Police Report

- Thanked the CERT Team, RACES, the Fire Department and other volunteers for their help with the Memorial Day Parade and the Rotary 5K this past weekend; thanked them for spending their own time on the weekends to help out. The Mayor commended these volunteers as well.
- Ed La Bruno and the Chief completed the Unity Tour again this year, the Ride to the Law Enforcement Memorial for fallen officers in the line of duty, in honor of Joe Wargo. The MAPS eighth grade students also visit the Memorial on their class trip to Washington.
- The Department is deep into the hiring process for a police officer; we have a time restriction with the Academy deadlines.
- On May 31st, Sergeant DiStasio graduated the Command Leadership Academy Program run by the State Chief's Association and stems from West Point; it is an elite program throughout the State. Most of our staff is trained and the remainder should be completed by the end of the year. This is a very extensive 13 week program which includes exams lasting 6-8 hours, all handwritten; it deals with management of personnel and leadership.

11. Borough Administrator's Report

- Thanked everyone involved for their support with the Memorial Day Parade, the volunteers, the staff, Police Department, DPW, our Fire Department, Christina Chismar for Recreation, our volunteers; it is a huge undertaking and the support is much appreciated.
- Just a few scheduling reminders:
 - The July Council meeting is July 10th, the second week of the month due to July 4th,
 - The Fireworks display will be held on Friday, June 29th, rain date of Friday, July 6th
 - Saturday, June 30th is the Veteran's Cruise, which is completely booked.
- We received a completed Vendor Permit Application for Anderson Farms Farm Market after the Agenda had been published. Chief Licata has reviewed the application and with Council approval, we will add this to Agenda Item #19 Motions; Anderson Farms would like to open June 30th prior to our next Council meeting.
- Ms. Rinaldi gave a general overview of the capital projects now that the budget has been adopted. Capital projects are really nothing more than a discussion or a plan until an ordinance is adopted (the financing mechanism for a capital project to commence) authorizing the expenditure on any projects. This includes items such as road improvements, water/sewer projects and building improvements. Other considerations include outside utility work schedules, such as NJ Natural Gas, County improvements and grant opportunities to offset costs; we need to make sure we plan accordingly for the current year and for moving forward.

- Water main extension for Windemere, Altenbrand, North Glen and Park Avenue: preliminary expense for engineering was already approved, waiting on final project design and then we can go out to bid.
- Curtis and Audrey Road: preliminary expense for engineering was already approved, as application required for Community Development Block grant. We received award notification this week of \$80,000 towards this project; waiting on final design and then can go out to bid.
- Henmar Drive, North Glen Avenue (Veteran's Way) and the remaining portion of Season's Drive: preliminary expense for engineering was already approved, as application required for NJDOT grant, awarded \$290,000 towards this project; waiting on final project design and then can go out to bid.
- Howard Boulevard sidewalk connection: preliminary expense for engineering was already approved, as application required for NJDOT grant, awarded \$96,452 towards this project; waiting on final project design and then can go out to bid.
- Additional capital projects currently under review include evaluating DPW recycling center walls, purchase and installation of an addition storage facility at Public Works, installation of and necessary appurtenances for generators at various municipal facilities (FEMA grant previously awarded for purchase of generators)
- Met with the County representatives to review the application process for the trail grant; the grant award process will probably take most of this year, the grant to be awarded in December, 2018.

12. Council Committee Reports

Councilman Delaney:

- Noted that our CERT Team and RACES are very energetic groups, always looking to help out.
- Councilman Delaney joined the Seniors recent trip to Broadway to "Beautiful", great trip, two busloads went.
- Thanked all those who came out to vote, although turnout was light.

Councilman Loughridge:

- Councilman Loughridge commended Christina Chismar for rescuing our volleyball program.
- Councilman Loughridge lives on the corner of Kadel and Henry and has noticed water on the roads. Borough Engineer Stan Puszczyk stated the water has been reported, it's a warranty item under contract and Mr. Puszczyk expects that they will be opening that up to do the repair by next week.
- Councilman Loughridge's daughter is a fourth grade teacher in Netcong and went on a class field trip on the Floating Classroom on Lake Hopatcong; she said it was phenomenal and a great program for the kids.

Councilman Windish:

- Councilman Windish stated he has been ill for a while, in the hospital for a month, home and then in again for another week.
- Congratulated Ray Simard (in the audience) on his win in the Primary Election. Councilman Windish stated he plans on running again as soon as his illness gets better and he is back in shape.

Councilman Sadow:

- Councilman Sadow congratulated the Mayor on his victory in the Primary Election.
- Councilman Sadow echoed the sentiments of the others regarding the Memorial Day Parade. However, he did ask for a special thank you to Debbie and Clint Hill. During the Parade, Pat Ficchio and Councilman Sadow walked together and Pat caught his toe on an elevated piece of pavement on the county road of Howard Boulevard; Pat fell in front of the Hills' house. Both Debbie and Clint came out with first aid supplies and water and patched Pat back up; he did finish the Parade.
- The Finance Committee is well aware of the report that Ms. Rinaldi just gave as these projects have been filtering through our Committee and ultimately to fruition. Councilman Sadow wanted to thank Millennium, H2M and especially CP Engineers for all the grants that they find, pursue and ultimately make ours; the way we do financing in Mount Arlington is largely pay as you go for these kinds of projects. Councilman Sadow reiterated that the tax rate, the municipal portion of the bill, has remained stable or lower for the last two years and was not a big increase the year before. We have

spent nearly \$1 million a year on improvements through grants and planning. The Mayor agreed with Councilman Sadow and stated it is really remarkable the amount of free money that the Borough has been experiencing in the last couple years with grants and land and property, such as Lake Rogerene, so let's keep the ball rolling on that. The Mayor stated that if there's money out there let's get it back here, we've given enough.

Council President Sorge:

- Council President Sorge publicly thanked all those who voted for him in the Primary, he appreciates it and thought after eighteen years people would get tired of him but it seems not. Council President Sorge stated he finds it an honor to serve this town and he is looking forward to continuing that service.

- Council President Sorge stated the Memorial Day Parade was fantastic and thanked Administrator Rinaldi and Christina Chismar.

13. Public Comment

Larry Andico, 56 Mountainview Avenue:

- Mr. Andico stated that for about four years now he has been contacting the Borough regarding property maintenance and zoning on Mountainview Avenue. Mr. Andico distributed pictures of the conditions on Mountainview to the members of Council. Mr. Andico stated there is no clean-up of the yards, there are four junk cars in one yard, a boat has been parked on the street for three years, the town lot that is there is full of tree branches. Mr. Andico stated that the house across the street from him is for sale and perspective buyers from Tennessee came over to speak with him; they said the house is worth it but the neighborhood is not. Mr. Andico questioned the actions of the Zoning Officer and stated the conditions are de-valuing their homes. Ms. Rinaldi stated she would speak with our Zoning Officer tomorrow. The Mayor stated that the lack of maintenance is a reflection on all of us and confirmed Ms. Rinaldi will speak with Tom Mahoney first thing tomorrow morning.

- Mr. Andico stated that in March he ran over a manhole on the county road of Windemere Avenue, the manhole cover was not there, and he sustained \$3,800 worth of damage to a brand new truck. The County said it was the Borough's responsibility because it was a sewer cap; Terry Smith was very helpful but the insurance company called and denied the claim denied because the missing cover was not reported and Mr. Andico had to pay for the repairs.

Bud Jones and Brian Ko of Nissivoccia were present. Mr. Ko thanked the Mayor and Council for their continued support over the years, and Ms. Rinaldi and staff for their patience during the audit, everyone does a wonderful job. The Borough is in a very strong financial position and the path that you are on will keep you in that strong financial position. Fund balance increased this year mostly due to the change in the personal income tax laws where everyone came at the end of the year to pay their taxes so if anyone was delinquent, they managed to catch up on that and pay the current year taxes. This year we paid off the First National Bank lease purchase, we have five more years left on the General Improvement Bonds in the capital fund; the plan is to be debt free in 2022. Mr. Ko stated we also had two recommendations in the Audit, not serious in nature, one is new and the other we have almost every year. Councilman Sadow stated the same recommendation has been made for the past ten years. and he thought maybe the auditors or CFO could outline a possible plan for eliminating the one consistent problem, recognizing we have been talking about the leanness and efficiency of the

people that work in Borough Hall. We continue to have a lack of complete separation of duties and perhaps we might want to address that. Ms. Rinaldi stated we actually have started those discussions this last year because there were some staffing changes; unfortunately, as a small municipality, this is very common. Mr. Ko stated Nissivoccia has about 70 municipalities and all but about 8 or 10 have the segregation of duties recommendation because of the size of staff, and it is a balancing act between having enough people and having the budget to increase staff to separate those duties. Mr. Ko stated he and Ms. Rinaldi have started to address that issue this past year.


