

**BOROUGH OF MOUNT ARLINGTON  
COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES  
MARCH 5, 2019  
7:00 p.m.**

**1. Call to Order**

- 2. Adequate notice** of this meeting of the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Mount Arlington was given as required by the Open Public Meetings Act as follows: Notice was published in the Daily Record and the Roxbury Register on December 13, 2018 and posted on the bulletin board in the main hallway of the Municipal Building on December 6, 2018; notice of this meeting is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act (N.J.S.A. 10:4-1 et seq.), the Borough Council opens every public meeting for comments of the public. However, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 10:4-12: "Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the discretion of a public body to permit, prohibit or regulate the active participation at any meeting....."

Speakers at Borough meetings shall have five minutes to present their comments to the Borough Council so as not to consume time that would otherwise be allotted to other persons who wish to speak.

**3. Flag Salute**

The Mayor asked the Girl Scouts to lead the flag salute. The Mayor asked for a moment of silence as we keep in our hearts and our prayers a speedy recovery for our fallen Officer James DiStasio.

**4. Roll Call**

Councilman Loughridge, Councilman Simard, Council President Delaney, Councilman Sorge, Mayor Stanzilis, Matthew O'Donnell, Esq., Borough Attorney, and Carolyn Rinaldi, CFO/Borough Administrator, were also present. Councilman Sadow and Councilman Cangiano were absent.

**5. Presentations**

- Girl Scout Troop 96641 Dance Routine (as performed at the Tree Lighting December, 2018)  
The Mayor welcomed the Girl Scouts and thanked the adult leaders for investing their time with the Scouts. The Mayor stated the greatest investment a person can make is an investment in the youth of our community. The Girl Scouts performed the four dance routines they had performed at the Tree Lighting. After the performance, the Mayor and Council President Delaney presented each Girl Scout and leader a Mount Arlington Community Excellence, Mayor Michael Stanzilis, commemorative coin.

- Marty Kane, Lake Hopatcong Foundation

Marty Kane introduced Holly Odgers, Managing Director of the Foundation, who is involved with the programs being discussed tonight. Mr. Kane gave an overview of the Foundation's vision, focus, activities and continuing efforts. Mayor Stanzilis added that Lake Hopatcong is an economic engine for the communities around the lake; the health of the Lake is the health of our communities as well. The Mayor requested the Foundation stay on point with regard to the Pavilion at Lee's Park, stating the pavilion needs to be of use to all of the residents of Morris County; it is paid for by the taxpayers of Morris County and not just a small group of people. The Mayor indicated he has been speaking with the Mayor of Hopatcong regarding the sterile carp; Mayor Francis is really behind these efforts. The Mayor thanked Mr. Kane and Ms. Odgers for their informative presentation.

- Lee Moreau, Lake Hopatcong Foundation

Lee Moreau of the Foundation spoke about the Sixth Annual Block Party to be held on Saturday, May 11, 2019 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. This year there will not be any bands but rather a stage set

for demonstrations and local entertainment, such as the Girl Scouts performance this evening. They are working on a Mayor's/leaders table, maybe programming some activities from each town; we can stagger the presentations so each town has a time slot between 12 p.m. and 2 p.m. Mr. Moreau stated one of the goals of the Party is to demonstrate unity around the lake. Mr. Moreau thanked the Mayor and Council for their continuing support by donating the Dial A Ride van for the day. The Veterans Cruise will be Saturday, June 28<sup>th</sup> and flyers and information will be forthcoming shortly.

#### 9. Mayor's Report

- The Request for Proposals for the Howard Boulevard Engineering Traffic Study is due to the County on March 8<sup>th</sup>; the winner will be announced at either the March 13<sup>th</sup> or March 27<sup>th</sup> Freeholder Meeting; all Council and the public are welcome to attend. Once we know the status, we will place this on our public media as well.
- Sad anniversary of former Mayor Arthur Ondish's passing; this Friday will be three years.
- Councilman Bob Sorge's birthday is this Friday, March 8<sup>th</sup>. The Mayor and Council and audience sang Happy Birthday to Mr. Sorge.

#### 10. Chief of Police Report

- There is a lot going on outside the normal business routine but the Department is doing good, getting back into the swing of things. Just today there was no room at headquarters; they had four people under arrest at one time and four different officers initiating the arrests. The Chief stated that despite everything going on, the Department is doing an outstanding job; he is very proud.
- Chris Coupe, the final member of the Chief's command staff, is in Commander Leadership training for the State Chief's Commander Leadership Academy which was created by West Point. Once Sergeant Coupe has completed, all supervisors of the department have attended; follows through with our education and training initiative for everyone in the department. Mayor Stanzilis stated Chris Coupe is a great asset to the team. Chief Licata stated Sergeant Coupe has a lot of outside responsibilities, does CPR instruction, any child seat installations, does whatever is asked of him and does an outstanding job.

- Chief wanted to give a big thank you to the community for all the support they have been showing. Anyone who heard about or was at the Stanhope House for the Jimmy D event knows the outpouring and support from this community was absolutely insane; it was a great event.

#### **11. Borough Administrator's Report**

- Bittersweet report, our Borough Clerk Linda, who has been with us since 2002, has announced her retirement; we are very excited for her but not very happy for us. Linda's last day will be May 31<sup>st</sup>. Ms. Rinaldi expressed that we all want to wish Linda the best, she will be missed. Mayor Stanzilis added that Linda has been a marvelous asset to our town and to the Mayor personally; when he first came onto Council, Linda was a great help to him. The Mayor stated we are both happy and blessed to have had Linda in our lives.

#### **12. Council Committee Reports**

##### **Councilman Loughridge:**

- Attended the Parks and Recreation Committee meeting:
  - the Community Garden will officially open April 13<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 p.m.
  - the Easter Egg Hunt is also April 13<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 a.m. at Memorial Park
  - the Lake Hopatcong Block Party is May 11<sup>th</sup> between 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
  - the Memorial Day Parade is Saturday, May 25<sup>th</sup> and Frank Maher, 94 year old resident, will be the Grand Marshall
  - we are holding a Mural Contest for the old tennis wall at the Community Garden; submissions can be either paper or submitted electronically. The deadline to enter is March 25<sup>th</sup> and the winner will be announced at the April 2<sup>nd</sup> Council Meeting.
- The Tax Collector and Tax Clerk came to the recent Seniors Club meeting to discuss the Senior Tax Freeze. The seniors loved the presentation and help; the Borough is lucky to have them on staff.
- Councilman Loughridge is still looking into the GaGa Ball but the weather has not been cooperative.

##### **Councilman Simard:**

- The Seniors meeting last week went well; 224 people in attendance and they all appreciated the Tax Department presentation.

##### **Councilman Sorge:**

- Attended a Water/Sewer/ Committee meeting.
- Councilman Sorge announced that he is retiring from Council; he will be moving to Florida in April. It is bittersweet for him, he has been on Council for 18 years. Councilman Sorge stated together with Mayor Ondish, they took this sleepy little town and grew it into a minor city; he is very proud of that. Councilman Sorge stated this is not a health issue, 18 years is enough, and thanked the Council and stated how he is going to miss them. Mayor Stanzilis stated that Councilman Sorge has been a tireless advocate and public servant in the true sense of it; he has given so much to this town over his 18 years of service and he has made a huge difference and a huge impact; streetscapes, sidewalks, connectivity of the town, a new police department, a new library, he fought off two police mergers with Roxbury, the truck stop, and the list goes on. The Mayor stated Councilman Sorge has done so much here and has been an incredible partner and mentor for the Mayor when he first started in this role. The Mayor stated it is amazing how much change has gone on in this town and it's been positive change. The Mayor quoted an old saying. "you either plan for Urban Sprawl or you get run over by it"; the Borough has survived and flourished in this Urban Sprawl, we grew in it in a very positive way and Councilman Sorge has played a huge part. Councilman Sorge stated, to paraphrase General McArthur, "A Councilman doesn't die, he only fades away". The Mayor also thanked Councilman Sorge for his service in Vietnam.

##### **Council President Delaney:**

- Council President Delaney stated he has been working with Councilman Sorge for two years now and he is honored to follow him as Council President; there has been a lot of mentoring and he personally thanked Councilman Sorge.

- We have started the bid process for some of the construction to occur this year. The Notice to Bidders for four projects are out, the pre-bid conferences are set for March 7<sup>th</sup> and the bid openings will be held on March 21<sup>st</sup>. These are for the final stretch of Howard Boulevard sidewalk, several of our roads will be completely rebuilt, and our DPW retaining wall will be reconstructed.

### 13. Public Comment

- Jane Caruso, 28 Hillard Road:

Ms. Caruso is here to represent the families on Logan Way. The road is in such disrepair it is disintegrating. Ms. Caruso did have some pictures and stated that one hole in front of her property and her neighbor's property is huge. There are about six families that are affected; when you come up to Logan Way you make a left and that is the section that is so bad. The hole in the road is across the whole road and is so deep that it fills with water. Ms. Caruso asked Council for someone to look at it the area, which needs drainage. Mr. Landry did look at the road and indicated the whole thing needed to be done from scratch, including the necessary drainage. Mayor Stanzilis stated he has been down that road and Ms. Caruso is absolutely right. Ms. Rinaldi stated that due to the weather conditions, no type of patch work can be done even though that would not alleviate the condition but it would be a temporary fix. Ms. Rinaldi stated the first order of business would be to speak with DPW and see how quickly, given the weather, this can be patched. Ms. Caruso stated the DPW men are great, they have been out to patch in the past. Ms. Rinaldi will speak with Stan Puszczyk of CP Engineers, James Landry's former employer, and discuss the next steps for rehabilitation. Ms. Rinaldi will contact Paul Nelson tomorrow to see what kind of temporary fix can be done, and then we will discuss a more permanent resolution with the engineers



## **PROCLAMATION**

### **AMERICAN RED CROSS MONTH 2019**

More than 137 years ago, the American Red Cross was established as a humanitarian organization, guided by seven fundamental principles—including humanity, impartiality and independence—to provide services to those in need regardless of race, religion, gender, sexual orientation or citizenship status. Today, the American Red Cross is one of the largest humanitarian organizations in the world, and delivers its mission every day to prevent and alleviate human suffering in the face of emergencies.

Every year, the American Red Cross responds to an average of more than 62,000 disasters across the country, from small home fires to devastating massive disasters. Last year's large crises included mudslides in California, a volcano in Hawaii, wildfires in Colorado and California, destructive hurricanes in Florida and the Carolinas, and a devastating typhoon in U.S. territories. Thousands of American Red Cross volunteers provided around-the-clock shelter for disaster victims, served millions of meals and snacks with partners, and distributed millions of relief items.

In New Jersey, the Red Cross has a long history of helping our neighbors in need. The Red Cross New Jersey Region assisted with 902 local disasters in the past year alone and helped save lives through our Home Fire Campaign. Since the campaign launched in October 2014, the New Jersey Region has worked with community partners to install more than 31,761 smoke alarms.
