1. Call Meeting to Order

Mrs. O'Reilly-Stanzilis called the May 13, 2019 Board of Health meeting to order at 6:30PM.

5. Presentations

A. Christina Chismar – Wellness Week

Mrs. Chismar presented a Wellness Week proposal for the Borough of Mount Arlington. The objective of a Wellness Week would be to involve the board of education and Mount Olive's public health educator, Samantha Bunsa, who could provide both youth and adult friendly materials for the weeklong event. Mrs. Chismar would like to integrate Recreation, Mayors Wellness and the Board of Health in this initiative. She is looking for ideas and guidance as well as participation from the Board of Health. Mrs. Chismar would also like to engage the Board of Education to assure their support and involvement in the Wellness Week initiative.

7. Approval of Sanitarian's and Nursing Report

A. March and April 2019

Mr. Webb reviewed the March and April 2019 Sanitarians and Nursing Report. The following highlights were noted:

- 69 McGregor Avenue Two dogs were found dead in the lake. They were brought to the Animal Hospital of Roxbury; they were not able to be identified. The animals appeared to have no trauma. The animal control office thinks the dogs were going after something in the lake and did not make it back to shore.
- 569 Eric Lane A feral cat was trapped and taken to the Animal Hospital of Roxbury. Medical care was provided, but placement for the cat was unsuccessful so the cat was euthanized.
- The State Health Department committee is proposing changes to NJ State Food Code "Chapter 24" with anticipated adoption in 2020. The plan is to adopt the FDA Code by reference. That way when the FDA code changes so will the requirements in the state code.
- Strategic plans continue to be worked on through the Mount Olive Board of Health.
- No Mount Arlington children attended the Child Health Clinic held on March 6, 2019.
- Mrs. Giles managed a respiratory outbreak at the Mount Arlington Senior Living facility which had 11 individuals affected; nine residents and two staff members.
- The Mount Olive accreditation team met several times over the past months. Most of the meetings were dealing with the strategic plan where goals and objectives were revised. Also, the rabies case management program was worked on.
- Workforce Development continues to be a focus with the goal of developing a
 workforce assessment survey to help determine staff member's competencies and
 to put development plans in place. Coleen McCay-Wharton is the program
 manager for the Center of Public Health Workforce Development at Rutgers and is
 helping with this effort.
- Mr. Stahlhut participated in the 2019 NJEHA conference for the first time where credits were earned.
- Mr. Morance noted that the number of cats and dogs licensed is down approximately 40% from previous years. Mr. Weigle said Mount Olive has seen the same decline in animal licensing numbers. The state has eliminated the

requirement for the Animal Census, but noted that the census keeps your number stable because you go out into the community knocking on doors and it tends to bring people in to license their animals.
